KEEPING WESTCHESTER HEALTHY. NOT JUST FED.

Nutrition and hunger relief go hand in hand. That's why Feeding Westchester is grateful to have agency partners, like Mount Vernon Neighborhood Health Center (MVNHC), who are a key part of keeping Westchester healthy—and not just fed. "Eat well. You can have energy, you can have health, and you can be healthy," says Marianela, a visitor of MVNHC's community nutrition program.

Because hunger and the lack of a balanced diet can have devastating effects on a person's physical, mental, and emotional health, community meal and nutrition programs like MVNHC's—which provide healthy food, recipes, and nutritional counseling—are critical.

Thanks to your partnership, Feeding Westchester can provide nutritious food to our neighbors facing hunger like Marianela. Lurlene, another MVNHC visitor, also benefits from consistent access to fresh produce and other healthy foods. Feeding Westchester "provide[s] us with the food that we need to stay healthy," she says. "Their efforts have a great impact on my life."

Elida, another program visitor, is navigating tough times with her family as her husband tries to secure employment. Having regular access to nutritious foods offers more than just nourishment. "With the support of Feeding Westchester, we have more hope," she smiles.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

We just closed out the last quarter of fiscal year 2023, and once again, you made an incredible impact on this amazing Westchester community. We're so proud to have you by our side.

Thanks to you, our generous supporters, we distributed nearly 11 percent more food since January than we originally estimated — providing meals to more children, senior, and family visits across the county. As we tally up the year's final numbers, we'll likely see similar annual findings.

This increase isn't surprising. We've been serving more than 20,000 additional neighbor visits every month than we were last fiscal year. Kids out of school for the summer are going hungry without free and reduced school

lunches, and SNAP cuts have left tens of thousands of neighbors without enough money to get by.

And with the loss of other relied-upon benefits, like Medicaid's continuous coverage and WIC, there doesn't seem to be a light at the end of the tunnel.

But we have you, our supporters. You are the light for our community.

NOURISH MORE. WASTE LESS.

"Reducing food waste and fighting hunger are causes that mean a lot to me and everyone I work with," says Claudia Pavone, Store Manager of ShopRite in Bedford Hills. ShopRite is a crucial partner in Feeding Westchester's Retail Recovery Program. Part of our Nourishing the Planet initiative, the program recovers nutritious food from local retailers to provide food to people in need.

ShopRite has supported Feeding Westchester's efforts for over 15 years. "We share their passion for distributing nutritious food and other resources to our communities," Claudia says. Thanks to dedicated partners like ShopRite and generous support from the Wells Fargo Foundation and Consolidated Edison, more food is being rescued each month than ever before.

Over 80% of our Mobile Food Pantry Program is supported by Retail Recovery. And, in fiscal year 2023, we collected more than 3 million pounds of produce, meat, and dairy products, breaking last year's record of 2.4 million pounds.

You have saved food from going to waste and nourished lives across Westchester.

Feeding Westchester serves
Westchester County, providing
food to a hunger-relief network
of more than 300 partners and
programs. With a mission to nourish
their neighbors in the fight against
hunger, the organization sources
and distributes good, nutritious
food and other resources to
wherever it is needed most.

In fiscal year 2023, Feeding Westchester provided more than 20 million pounds of food. That's nearly 17 million meals through soup kitchens, food pantries, schools, shelters, residential programs, and mobile distributions. That served more than 220,000 neighbor visits — including visits from children, seniors, veterans, and hardworking families — every month. The nonprofit, a 4-star Charity Navigator organization, is committed to creating a community where all people have access to the food they need today, and the fundamental resources to build a better tomorrow.


