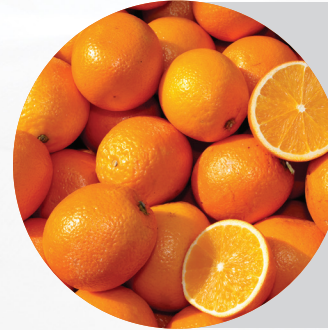

Nourishing Children

These programs provide critical nourishment and alleviate the tough choices families face when providing essentials for their young ones.

Child-Feeding Programs

Nutritious, easy-to-prepare food that kids need on weekends and during school closures, distributed via our partner hubs

Feeding United Home Deliveries

Supplemental staple foods accompanied by play and learning materials for kids, delivered directly to households in need through our partnerships with United Way of Westchester and Putnam and DoorDash

School Pantries

Established with our educational partners across Westchester including elementary, middle, high schools, and local college campuses



Nourishing The Planet

Feeding Westchester captured more than 3.7 million pounds of good, nutritious food from 57 retail partners that would otherwise have gone to waste. At our distribution center, we inspect, sort, and pack the food, then get it straight to the people who need it most.



Nourishing Seniors

Feeding our seniors today helps offer a healthier life for our elders throughout the community.

Senior Grocery

Encourage better health and independent living for seniors in need through distribution of nutritious food like seasonal fruits and vegetables

Food is Medicine

Collaborate with hospitals, clinics, and federally qualified health centers to eliminate barriers to improved health and well-being



Nourishing Communities

These integral programs sustain our mission to nourish our neighbors in the fight against hunger.

Emergency Food Providers (EFPs)

Community-based feeding partnerships, where those with sudden needs receive the food they require

Mobile Distributions

Our Mobile Food Pantry (MFP) and Fresh Markets make 500+ scheduled stops a year, bringing fresh, nutritious food to underserved communities across the county

Nutrition Education

Free access to nutrition education including healthy eating and wellness, interactive workshops, cooking demonstrations, and food safety training

SNAP

Helping people in need enroll in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) — a federal initiative that helps thousands of low-income Westchester residents put food on their tables

Green Thumb

Increasing access to fresh, seasonal, produce, and valuable nutritional information in collaboration with our partner agencies

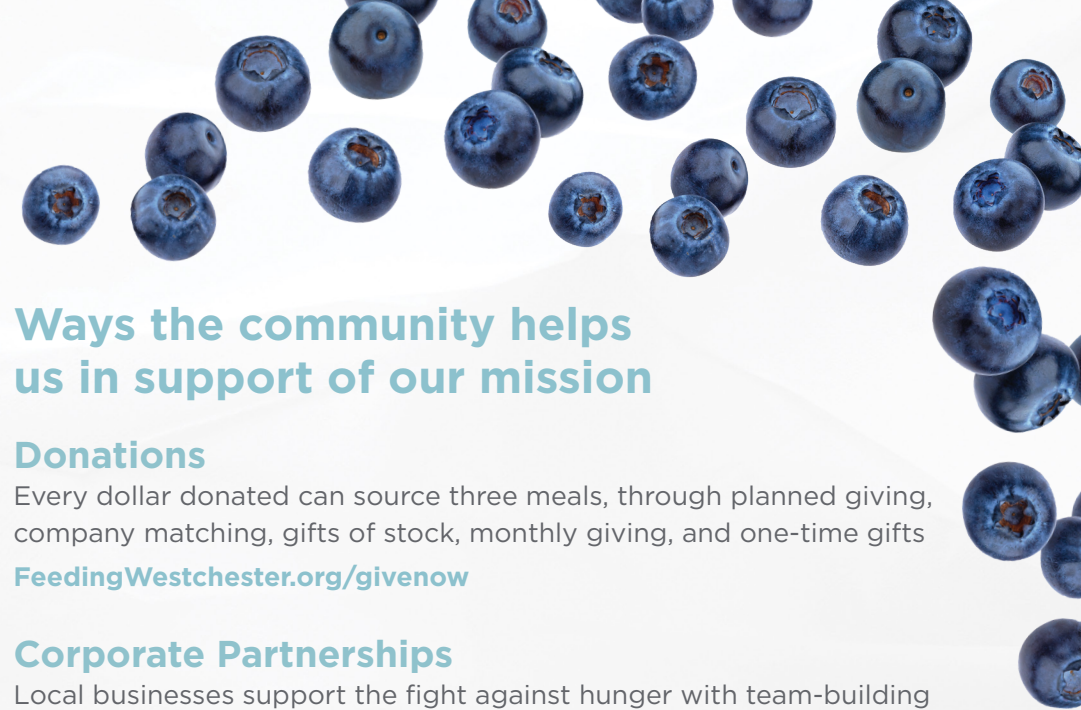

HUNGER RELIEF SYSTEMS ANALYSIS

Empowering Change Through Insight and Action

The Hunger Relief Systems Analysis (HRSA), a groundbreaking initiative completed by Feeding Westchester and the Boston Consulting Group, is a first-of-its-kind analysis in our county, that has provided valuable insight into the scope of hunger and its underlying causes

Understanding the Landscape

Utilizing advanced Geographic Information Systems (GIS) technology, we created a comprehensive map highlighting the critical areas where hunger relief services are most needed. Neighborhoods in four communities—Mount Vernon, New Rochelle, Ossining, and Yonkers—were identified as having the most structural challenges.

Listening to Lived Experiences

By understanding the unique challenges of our neighbors via one-to-one interviews and surveys, we gained invaluable perspectives that informed our strategies. Their voices reinforced the need for cultural sensitivity and coordination among hunger-relief partners.

Strategic Initiatives for Change

Building on these insights, Feeding Westchester identified four priority initiatives to enhance equitable access to food services:

1 Regular Listening Sessions

Engage with individuals and families seeking food assistance to understand their lived experience and barriers to access

2 Improving Pantry Experiences

Assist feeding partners in high-need areas to better provide dignified and respectful experiences

3 Capacity Enhancement

Collaborate with partners to expand and improve distribution sites, ensuring they meet the growing demand

4 Agency Enablement

Facilitate the pickup, storage, and distribution of fresh, nutritious products direct from local retail partners to food pantries

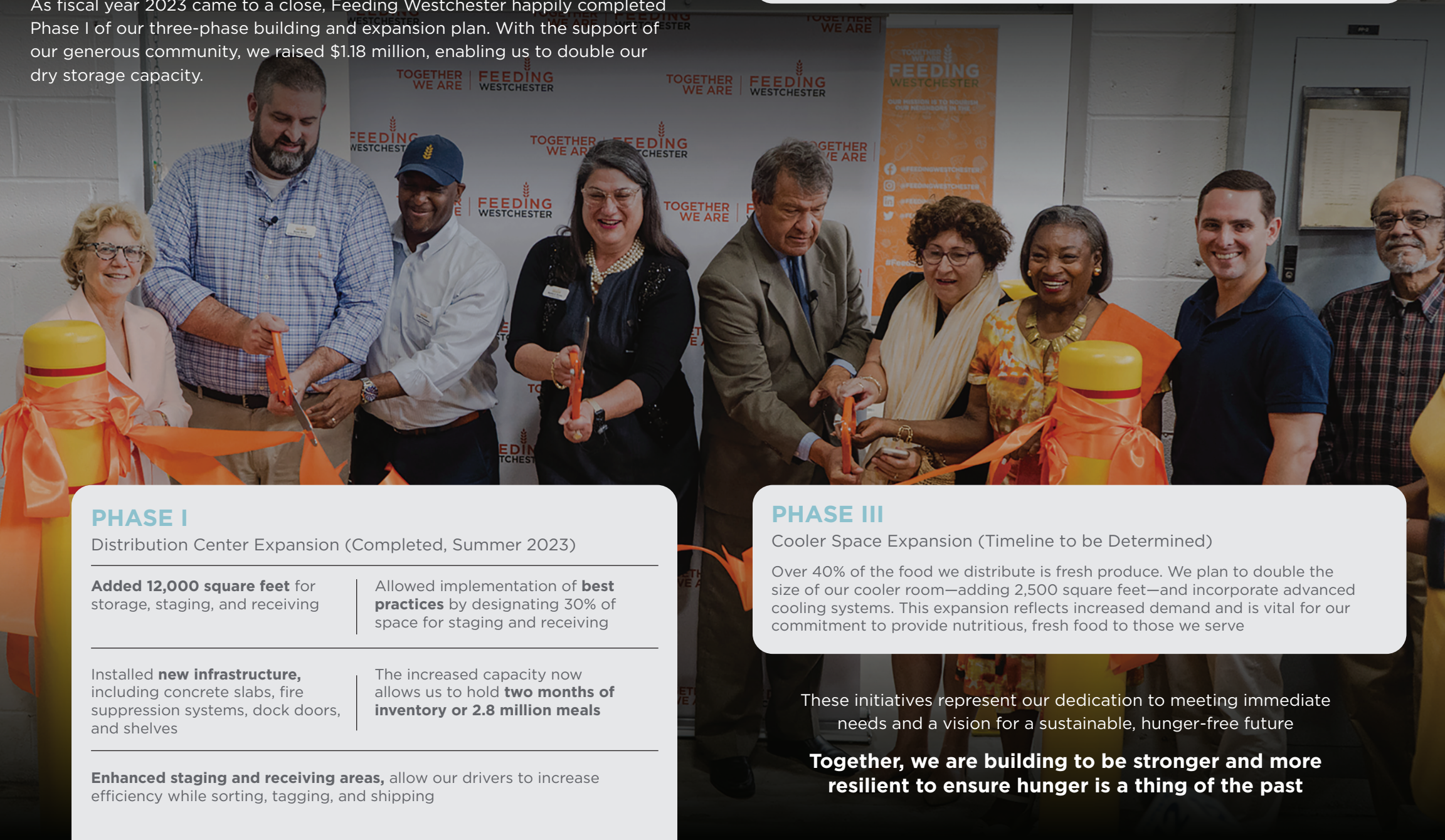
DISTRIBUTION CENTER EXPANSION

As fiscal year 2023 came to a close, Feeding Westchester happily completed Phase I of our three-phase building and expansion plan. With the support of our generous community, we raised \$1.18 million, enabling us to double our dry storage capacity.

PHASE II

Office Space Expansion (happening in 2024)

Our office expansion is well underway as this report is issued. **6,500 square feet of additional office space** directly adjacent to our Elmsford facility will accommodate our growing team and enhance collaboration



PHASE I

Distribution Center Expansion (Completed, Summer 2023)

Added **12,000 square feet** for storage, staging, and receiving

Allowed implementation of **best practices** by designating 30% of space for staging and receiving

Installed **new infrastructure**, including concrete slabs, fire suppression systems, dock doors, and shelves

The increased capacity now allows us to hold **two months of inventory or 2.8 million meals**

Enhanced staging and receiving areas, allow our drivers to increase efficiency while sorting, tagging, and shipping

PHASE III

Cooler Space Expansion (Timeline to be Determined)

Over 40% of the food we distribute is fresh produce. We plan to double the size of our cooler room—adding 2,500 square feet—and incorporate advanced cooling systems. This expansion reflects increased demand and is vital for our commitment to provide nutritious, fresh food to those we serve

These initiatives represent our dedication to meeting immediate needs and a vision for a sustainable, hunger-free future

Together, we are building to be stronger and more resilient to ensure hunger is a thing of the past

AN EVENING IN GOOD TASTE

In April, Westchester's top chefs reunited for the highly anticipated **"An Evening in Good Taste"** after a three-year hiatus. In collaboration with The Westchester and Kate Schlientz of IntoxiKate, the event was a celebration of exquisite cuisine and fine beverages, bringing together Feeding Westchester supporters for an unforgettable night of networking and epicurean indulgence. Beyond the culinary delights, the event's purpose was clear: raise funds for the local community, ensuring healthy, nutritious food for those facing hunger.

The impact was profound, with the event surpassing expectations and **raising over \$300,000** through ticket sales, donations, and a silent auction. This remarkable achievement reflected the community's dedication to Feeding Westchester's mission. The funds, staying within the community, directly contributed to providing essential support to Westchester's neighbors in need.

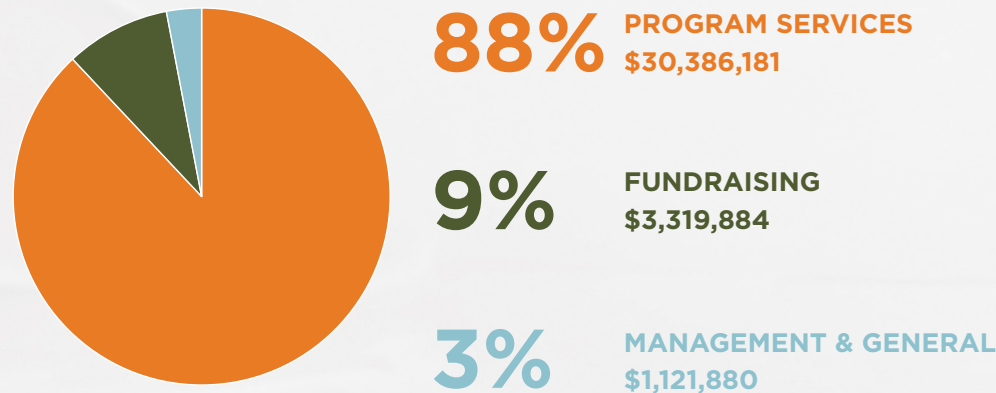
