#### You help keep families fed all year long

f you ask Maria what her favorite meal to cook is, she'll tell you that she loves to make foods that are traditional to her family: rice, beans, and chicken. But if you ask her 7-year-old son, Kyle, what his favorite food is that his mom makes?

"Pasta!"

But no matter what's for dinner, Kyle loves his time with his parents and 2-year-old sister around the table. "I like eating with my family," he says.

Unfortunately, prices for everything from food to gasoline to everyday household necessities have skyrocketed during the past few years, and they've never come back down. That means Maria's paycheck from her housekeeping work doesn't stretch as far as it used to.

"I have a job, but that's not enough," she says. "Everything now is expensive."

During the school year, Kyle is able to get free breakfast and lunch at school, but during the summer, he loses access to the food his growing body needs. So Maria takes her children to a food distribution at their elementary school when she needs help putting food on the table. "It helps so much," she says gratefully.

eeding Westchester's partnership with local colleges — we have 16 school pantries, including 5 at local colleges — is incredibly important to the community and to the students it benefits. Many college students are balancing a class schedule, homework, and part-time jobs while struggling to keep up with the rising cost of groceries. Some students also find there isn't enough time to visit the grocery store, purchase nutritious food, and prepare meals. Because of support from friends like you, we can supply food to on-campus pantries and provide access to our Mobile Food Pantry.

But our support extends beyond providing food, as shown when our President and CEO, Karen C. Erren, delivered the commencement address for Westchester Community College's (WCC) School of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences.

Karen inspired the Class of 2024 with a message rooted in the college's motto: "WCC's seal contains the phrase *Sapere Aude* — Dare to Know — reflecting a commitment to knowledge and learning as keys that unlock the future. nwar loves cooking for his family of six! Unfortunately, a few months ago, Anwar lost his job at the gas station where he worked. Now he drives for Uber when he's able to, but the work isn't always reliable. High gas and food prices make it even harder to make ends meet like he used to — especially with six people to feed.

Thankfully, Anwar was able to visit a recent food distribution at his children's elementary school, along with his sons, 5-year-old Muhammad and 7-year-old Ibrahim. He was especially excited to learn that the pantry was distributing meat, which can be difficult to access on a limited budget.

Supporters like you make these school pantries possible, and that helps neighbors like Anwar!

"Food is really expensive right now," Anwar says. "All of this helps."

Feeding Westchester serves Westchester County, providing food to a hunger-relief network of nearly <u>300 partners and programs. With a</u> mission to nourish our neighbors in the fight against hunger, we source and distribute good, nutritious food and other resources to wherever they are needed most.

In fiscal year 2024, we provided more than 23 million pounds of food which was equivalent to more than 19 million meals – through soup kitchens, food pantries, schools, shelters, residential programs, and mobile distributions.

That served an average of more than 228,000 neighbor visits including visits from children, seniors, veterans, and hardworking families every month. We are a 4-star Charity Navigator organization, committed to creating a community where all people have access to the food they need today, and the fundamental resources to build a better tomorrow.
