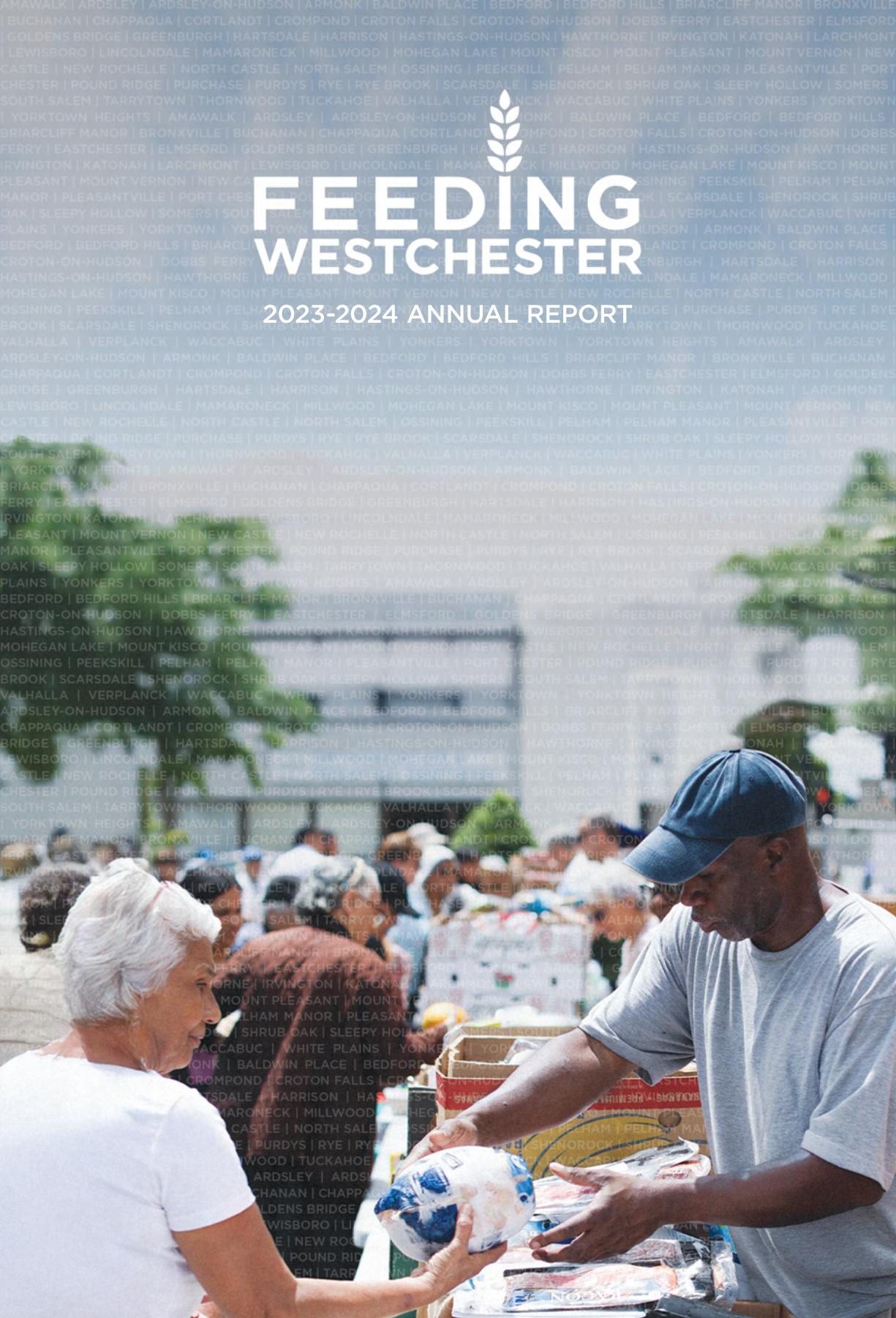

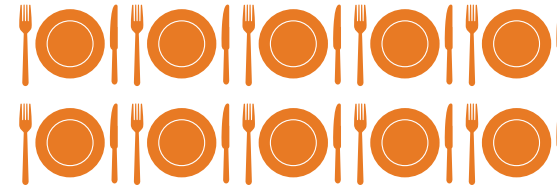

MEET LINDA & JADEN

Linda Ramos knows the fear that comes with hunger. “When you go home and you open your refrigerator and you know there’s nothing there, it’s scary,” she says. Her story shows the critical role Feeding Westchester plays—not just in providing food, but in offering hope and a sense of security to families facing hunger.

Linda’s journey has been challenging. After escaping a domestic violence situation while pregnant, she took her two children and moved back to New York, hoping for support. But when that help didn’t come, Linda found herself in a shelter, struggling to provide for her family. “The lowest moment was looking at the refrigerator and asking, ‘Am I gonna eat today? Am I gonna find food tomorrow?’” she recalls.

Thanks to Feeding Westchester and partner Westchester Community Health Center, Linda’s worries about food began to fade. “Feeding Westchester helps us to know that there is hope,” she says. “It gives us a sense of—you don’t have to worry about food. You don’t have to worry, ‘Am I going to eat?’”

Because of your support, Linda has been able to nourish her family, easing the financial burden and giving her access to healthy, nutritious food. Her son Jaden is now preparing to become the first in the family to attend college — an achievement Linda calls “a mother’s dream.”

Child-Feeding Programs: Over 94,000 children receive nutritious food annually through school pantries, day cares, and our **Feeding United Home Deliveries** program, helping them stay healthy and focused.

Emergency Food Providers (EFPs): Nearly 300 partners and programs deliver food to neighbors in urgent need.

Feeding United Home Deliveries (FUHD): In collaboration with *United Way of Westchester and Putnam* and *DoorDash*, this program assembles and distributes 34,700 grocery bags annually, overcoming transportation barriers.

Food is Medicine Program: Provides medically tailored meals to over 10,500 seniors annually, promoting better health outcomes.

Green Thumb Program: Distributes over 8 million pounds of fresh produce annually—40% of all food distributed—supporting healthier diets for families.

Mobile Food Pantry and Fresh Markets: Makes 500+ annual stops in underserved areas, supporting nearly 64,000 neighbor visits with fresh food.

Nutrition Education Program: Educates over 1,900 participants yearly on healthy eating and meal preparation.

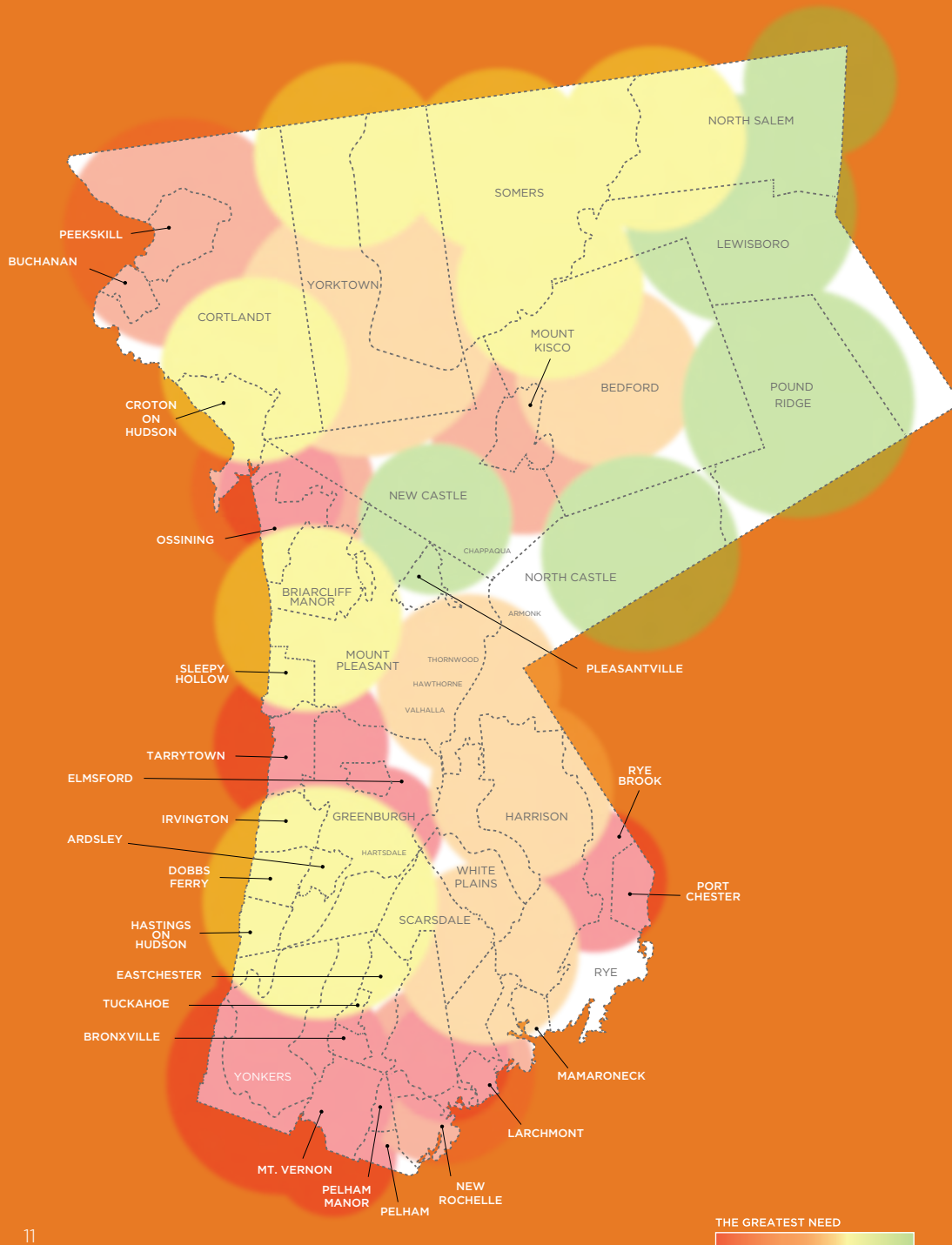
Retail Recovery Program: Diverts 4.5 million pounds of food annually from waste to families in need.

School Pantries: Provides pantry staples and fresh food through over 69,000 neighbor visits annually, supporting the education and well-being of students and their families.

Senior Grocery Program: Supplies over 51,500 seniors annually with nutrient-rich foods to support healthy aging.

OUR SUPPORTERS

We couldn't achieve our mission without the incredible generosity and unwavering support of **individuals, corporate partners, community organizations, foundations, places of worship, federal, state, and local government, volunteers, and our dedicated food donors**—including retailers, wholesalers, and other key contributors. This year, their collective efforts have been extraordinary, helping us make a real difference in the fight against hunger.

Thanks to this incredible network of supporters, we raised an astounding **\$37.9 million** to fund critical programs and initiatives that provide healthy, nutritious meals to neighbors in need. Equally inspiring, our volunteers contributed an impressive **6,036 hours** of their time—a **6% increase from last year**—by sorting and packing food in our warehouse, assisting at community distributions, and supporting special events.

Our supporters found many ways to help this year:

- **Donations:** All contributions—whether one-time, recurring, Donor-advised fund (DAF) or matching—provide vital funding for programs that deliver nutritious meals to neighbors in need.
- **Corporate Partnerships:** Businesses support our mission by sponsoring events, organizing food drives, and engaging employees as volunteers.
- **Hosting Fundraisers:** Community-led events and campaigns help raise funds and awareness to fight hunger locally.
- **Planned Giving:** Legacy gifts ensure the long-term impact of our mission, helping provide food and resources for our neighbors in need.
- **Volunteers:** By sorting food, assisting at distributions, and supporting events, volunteers directly impact our community.
- **Help From Home:** Flexible opportunities like assembling Help From Home Bags filled with seasonal meals let supporters make a difference remotely with co-workers or community groups.

This year also brought significant growth in awareness and engagement. We saw **media mentions increase 14%**, and our social media community grew by **12%**, reaching **19,564 followers**. Local partnerships strengthened with **12 elected officials** visits showcasing the importance of collaboration with government leaders. Additionally, **12,461 supporters** joined us in advancing our mission through financial donations, empowering us to provide vital resources to neighbors in need.

Together, these efforts are building momentum toward a **stronger, healthier Westchester**. When people come together with **compassion and purpose**, incredible things happen. Whether you donated funds, volunteered time, or shared our message, you've made a tangible impact in the lives of our neighbors.

FACILITY EXPANSION

PHASE TWO: BUILDING FOR COLLABORATION AND GROWTH

As part of our multi-year plan for critical expansion, **Feeding Westchester is proud to announce the completion of Phase Two**, which includes a **brand-new Sorting Room and 6,500 square feet of additional office and meeting space** adjacent to our Elmsford facility.

This **new Sorting Room** is designed to **improve efficiency** and enhance our ability to handle **increased food distributions**, while the **expanded office space** will:

- **Accommodate our growing team**, providing the resources and environment they need to thrive.
- **Foster collaboration and innovation**, enhancing teamwork across all departments.
- **Support operational growth**, ensuring we can continue to meet the increasing needs of the Westchester community.

This project represents key steps in our plan:

- **Phase 1:** Added **12,000 square feet** for storage, staging, and receiving to increase capacity and streamline operations.
- **Phase 2:** Added a new **Sorting Room** and **6,500 square feet of office and meeting space** to improve efficiency and support our growing team.
- **Phase 3:** Planned **expansion of our Cooler** to enhance storage for perishable items and support increased food distribution.
- **Phase 4:** Planned addition of **6,865 square feet of space for dry storage**, increasing our distribution center to **62,000 square feet** and **expanding loading docks** for greater efficiency.

In April 2024, **Westchester's top chefs and wine experts reunited for the highly anticipated "An Evening in Good Taste," marking its second consecutive return after a three-year hiatus.** This signature event brought together some of the most influential supporters of Feeding Westchester for a night of **culinary excellence, networking, and shared purpose.**

The event exceeded expectations, **raising over \$420,000** through ticket sales, sponsorships, donations, and a silent auction. **The funds raised directly supported Feeding Westchester's mission to provide healthy, nutritious food to those in need, right here in our local community.**

Guests enjoyed **exquisite dishes, fine wines, craft beers, and specialty cocktails** curated by 44 participating restaurants and beverage purveyors. The sold-out evening attracted more than 600 attendees, creating an inspiring atmosphere of generosity and solidarity in the fight against hunger. **The overwhelming success of the event underscored the community's dedication to ensuring that everyone in Westchester has access to nutritious food.**

CORPORATIONS COMPETE TO FIGHT HUNGER

In June 2024, ten local companies joined in the fight against hunger “competition style” at **Feeding Westchester’s annual Golden Scoop Corporate Packing Competition**. This fun—yet highly competitive—event resulted in **3,000 boxes of food** packed and distributed to Westchester seniors.

Golden Scoop is a great way for corporations to give back through volunteering while providing employees with a unique and engaging team-building opportunity.

This year, **Stop & Shop reclaimed the trophy** from Captain Lawrence Brewing Co., who generously hosted the event and finished a close second. **PKF O’Connor Davies earned recognition again as the Top Fundraising Team**.

In total, the teams packed **24,000 pounds (12 tons!) of food** and **provided 18,000 meals** in support of Feeding Westchester’s **Nourishing Seniors programs**. In addition, **participating teams raised over \$53,000** to benefit Feeding Westchester’s mission.

Elevating Voices: Encouraging community members to share their stories and participate in advocacy coalitions, strengthening our collective impact.

OUR ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024

Because of your voice and support, we achieved impactful advocacy wins that bring us closer to a hunger-free Westchester. Together, we've:

- Partnered with Westchester County in Fiscal Year 2024, enabling us to provide **1.2 million meals to neighbors in need**.
- Secured increased funding for vital hunger relief programs, including **Healthy School Meals, Nourish New York (NNY), the Nutrition Outreach and Education Program (NOEP), and the Hunger Prevention and Nutrition Assistance Program (HPNAP)**.
- **Hosted 12 elected official tours and visits**, fostering stronger partnerships and advocacy.
- Continued raising awareness of Farm Bill priorities, emphasizing the protection of the **Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)** and the strengthening of Supplemental **Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)** and **Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)** benefits.

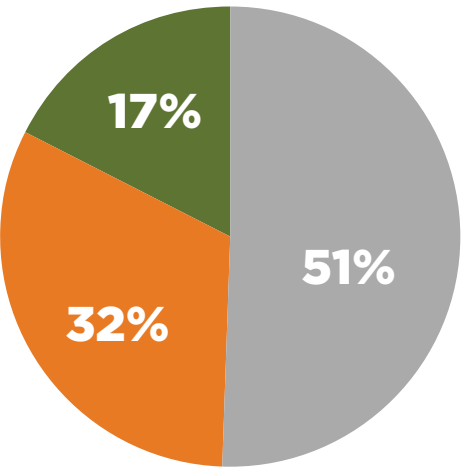

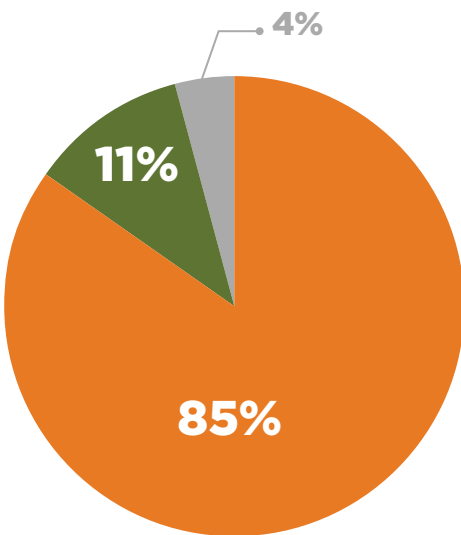
